A good education system for all - Finland

PISA 2018 – smallest differences between performance In all areas. Little variation between student performance across curriculum and personal achievement compared to the rest of the world, meaning Finnish education is well rounded and meets all areas of need.

Finland higher than UK in reading in PISA 2018. Yet we cram with phonics from age 4 and they only start to teach reading in Grade 2 (year 3) as an intervention if children cannot already read naturally.

Education is developed in partnership with one union serving all sectors. It is non political and led by educational experts. Any educational reform is instigated and designed by educationalists. Non political means that reform is only made when necessary and when thoroughly thought through, no competition between schools, all offer the same, private education is rare. No ranking across the country on performance and no inspections. Teachers have to do a masters degree.

Central decisions: Educational priorities, minimum time allocation, national cor curricula, size of state subsidies

Local decisions: Educational priorities eg which language, local curriculum, allocation of subsidies, class size, recruitment, teacher evaluations

You can go to university without qualifications, you apply to do a test on your external experience.

All education is free.

After basic education, 55% choose Upper secondary, 43% vocational (huge increase after push in past years) 3% other

Finland had to build up an industry after the war so had to educate and train people to build the economy. They focused on their education system and slowly became one of the most educated and very rich economies.

Special Educational Needs : Special Support (multi agencies, individual plans) 9%, Intensified support (outside agency, learning plans) 12%, General support

SEN not stigmatised, SEN groups within the school.

Education providers have main responsibility for quality, SELF EVALUATION.
